## How are you planning to commemorate Independence Day this year?

Try and put yourself in the shoes of someone who might argue a different position to you. Keep in mind the articles, posts, clips, and other media you may have come across that capture the tension around this year's holiday.

Identify the range of perspectives and emotions that surface as you take steps towards a middle ground between the perspectives. While it may seem uncomfortable, once you pass the center, try to articulate opinions that don't immediately resonate with you.
